

2025 AGM and Elections





RAAC Corps Conference Update

The Association Patron BRIG Ted Acutt attended this year's Corp Conference and provided the following summary, as published in IRONSIDES magazine.

The annual RAAC Conference was conducted at the School of Armour in Puckapunyal at the beginning of May this year. There has been a changing of the guard with a new RAAC Representative Honorary Colonel, MAJGEN Michael Krause replacing MAJGEN Craig Orme, and a new Head of Corps BRIG Andrew Moss taking the reins from BRIG Chris Gardner. The majority of unit Honorary Colonels were also present as well as all CO and RSMs. MAJGEN Krause continues to be responsible for developing Army doctrine and warfighting and BRIG Moss is the Commandant of the Land Combat College. Both are ideally placed to support and influence the future of the RAAC.

These are challenging times for the Army and the RAAC as the Army responds to the government's requirements laid out in the Defence Strategic Review. The focus of the four days was on the Corps as a whole and the future direction it should take. Discussion was open, respectful and aimed at producing outcomes and guidance for the Chief of Army and his headquarters. This brief will cover three key areas that were the focus of the four days.

Firstly, greater consideration was given to the GRES with the entire first day of the conference focused on these units. Their situation is on the up as they have been allocated an increased role in Homeland Security and equipped with Hawkeye (PMV-L) vehicles. Vehicle numbers are still small, and support limited, but this is a move in the right direction. Australia's strategic circumstance implies we have become more reliant on the Reserve and they need to attract greater resources to meet these demands.

Secondly, throughout the conference the key risk that continued to emerge was recruitment and retention. The RAAC is receiving new tanks and Cavalry vehicles that are highly capable, but the ADF is struggling to attract the numbers of young Australians needed to operate all the capability needed to conduct modern combat, particularly in Australia's area of interest. Significant priority will need to be given to this issue going forward. This leads to the third key area where the RAAC has the lead.

Due to 1st Armoured Regiments new experimental role, the unit is the lead in Robotic and Autonomous Systems. Instead of an entire crew, one person can remotely control a fighting vehicle. In future, one person could control several vehicles. The unit is also testing drones and other capabilities that are now dominating the battlespace. The unit has only undertaken this role in recent times, and it is a credit to all involved how far they have come. The unit will participate in major exercises including Talisman Sabre this year.

In putting this brief together and in consideration of 1AR's new role, I reached out to MAJGEN Krause for his thoughts. He was kind enough to send me extracts of what he is putting together for senior officers in Army. His extracts are in italics.

"1 AR in its experimental role provides tremendous opportunities for not only the Corps but also the whole of the Army. The Corps embraces that unit and is strongly supportive without a hint of hubris that RAAC is the best corps to command an experimental unit. Modelling and encouragement is being generated so that the RAAC trade model gives everyone an opportunity to serve in that Unit, in order to gain an opportunity to think about future systems. As noted below, there is even more that this Unit could do.

It remains your Corps' experts view that the optimal way to train the tanks in Townsville is to provide a dedicated headquarters over them. It is also the optimal way to train 3 Bde's cavalry. It is not that it is impossible to have 2 Cav look the way it is, it's just not optimal. I appreciate that this requires careful timing and scarce personnel. Probably of more import is that, with 1 RAR earmarked as the GCE of the AAF, 3 Bde only has two BGp HQs. Raising another BGp HQ in 3 Bde should be given a greater priority to solve two problems.

As noted above, RAAC embraces the unit as a part of the Corps, and will double-down on it. There may already be moves in this direction, but I would recommend we broaden the role of the unit to look at as many facets of the future as possible. The headquarters should be established as a manoeuvre battlegroup HQ and should be tasked with experimenting as the BGp HQ of the Future. The unit should also be looking at future tactics. The BGp HQ is already exercising with 3 Bde, an important development that should be encouraged and expanded. You will excuse us for wanting our cake and eat it too; if another BGp HQ is raised in Townsville to train the tanks, it should not be at the expense of the experimental unit. This should remain an RAAC command."

The RAAC is in good hands, has a plan for the future, and the will to see it through.

VALE André Scheitler 1940 - 2024

Those who served during the Leopard era will most likely be familiar with André, most particularly the gunnery instructors. The following article was sent in by Craig Burn, as published in the 2024 issue of Ironsides.


With the untimely passing of André Scheitler in September 2024, we have used an article featured in the 2009 edition of the RAAC Journal Ironsides, as the basis of a tribute to a man well known and respected by countless tank officers and soldiers of the RAAC.

MM&D - The Leopard Lifesaver

Tucked away in a refurbished building that was formerly the paint shop of the old 4 Base Workshop Battalion, East Bandiana; was a tiny sub-unit of the Land Engineering Agency – the Material Maintenance and Development Cell (MM&D).

Since MM&D was created in 1980 (originally titled Maintenance Development Section), this diminutive group of dedicated engineers has provided engineering solutions to the Australian Army which resulted in significantly higher rates of serviceability of various items of equipment (particularly in the Leopard MBT) and cost savings totalling millions of dollars.

In 1977 the Leopard MBT was introduced into service and issued to the Armoured Centre and 1st Armoured Regiment to replace the 25 year old



Centurion fleet. The Leopard brought with it a quantum leap in technology. To increase the first round hit probability and decrease the engagement time, the tank was equipped with a state-of-the-art SABCA (Societe Anonyme Belge de Constructions Aeronautiuqe) company of Belgium, tank fire control system (TFCS). The world leading technological innovation of the TFCS, was the use of a ballistic computer in combination with a laser range finder and turret stabilisation system.

During the first years of service, numerous difficulties were encountered attempting to formulate a total field, and base repair capability for the maintenance of the TFCS. The problem became so chronic that in 1979 DGEME undertook a study into the maintenance of the TFCS. This study identified the need for several pieces of very expensive test equipment and proposed that an option to overseas purchase, may be the in-house development of much of this equipment. Critical to the success of the proposed in-house development was the services of the SABCA engineer and customer service representative, Mr André Scheitler.

During the introduction of the Leopard into service, André's initial task was to carry out warranty repairs on behalf of SABCA. This task expanded to include the retrofit of lasers (the tanks arrived without laser sub systems fitted) and the second retrofit of lasers after the laser manufacturer Selenia of Rome Italy; carried out the repair of all laser heads due to failed laser rods.

André Scheitler was born in Brussels Belgium in 1940 and graduated from the Brussels University in September 1964 following a three-year course with a degree in Electronics and Telecommunications. Following 15 months National Service in the Belgium Army as a Signals Officer (1965-66) he worked as a Radiation Research Officer for a short time at Brussels Louvain University. In September 1966 he was selected by SABCA and sent to America to the Hughes Aircraft Company, Culver City California, for 15 months to conduct a feasibility study on the possibility of designing a Tank Fire Control System capable of being installed in all US Army M47 Patton medium tanks. The terms of reference of the study were that the proposed system had to consist of an optical sight with a mirror drive, a Ruby-Laser Rangefinder, a Ballistic Computer and a Gun/Turret Stabiliser.

Following acceptance of the feasibility study, the first TFCS was designed and built at Hughes Aircraft Company. The system was user certified in 1969 and installed in the M47 tanks. Eventually orders followed from the following Leopard user nations – Belgium Army 350 systems, Australian Army 100 systems, Canadian Army 95 systems and, in 1980, 300 systems were ordered by the Jordanian Army to be retrofitted to their Centurion MBTs.

In December 1976 André was sent to Australia by SABCA for a period of six months mainly to oversee the introduction of Leopard MBT into the Australian Army, particularly the TFCS, to solve the remaining production problems and ensure

warranty. This period eventually stretched to eight years until July 1985 when he left SABCA and joined the Australian Public Service as an engineer in MM&D.

Over the intervening 24 years, André and his team successfully supplied a multitude of engineering solutions to the benefit of the Australian Army. Of particular benefit to the RAAC and AFV crewmen were a range of initiatives including:

- Design of the Leopard MBT Electronic Digital Gunnery Aid (EDGA)
- Design and manufacture of the stand-alone Tank Level Aiming and Firing Trainer (TALAFIT)
- Design and manufacture of ASLAV and MBT sub calibre systems
- Support to the development of Leopard Tank Thermal Sight (LTTS) (Project NINOX)

André was an engineer of vast knowledge, great vision, and incredible enthusiasm. He was a technical mentor to Commanding Officers, Technical Adjutants, Gunnery Instructors, and tank commanders of the 1st Armoured Regiment. His late-night professional development lectures in the Jacka Club were legendary. His knowledge and engineering prowess was central to teaching the science, capability and limitations of the TFCS. He could talk endlessly about ballistic computations resulting from the integration of an array of sensor inputs, laser returns, and the turret stabilisation system. The ensuing technical mastery of the Leopard turret enabled optimisation of tactics, techniques and procedures developed by the tank commanders of that era. For those that worked with him, his memory will forever be revered. There is no doubt that the Good Lord was smiling on the Australian Army when André Scheitler was sent to Australia for just 'six months!'

REGIMENTAL NEWS



The Regiment's Adjutant, CAPT James Hodges, has sent through the following update of the Regiments' recent activities.

April through to June has marked another high-tempo period for the 1st Armoured Regiment as we continue to lead the way in combat experimentation across the Australian Army. With a deliberate focus on future capability and the integration of Robotic and Autonomous Systems (RAS), the Regiment has maintained its strong tempo while preserving the fighting culture that defines our history and ethos.

Over the past quarter, the Regiment has executed two major experiment serials at the Cultana Training Area. These activities tested a range of emerging technologies, including small and large Uncrewed Ground Vehicles (UGVs), First Person View (FPV) Uncrewed Aerial Systems (UAS), and Counter-UAS (CUAS) methods. These trials weren't theoretical – they were conducted by our Squadrons in realistic, combatrepresentative scenarios. Importantly, this period also saw the Regiment make significant contributions to the Army's conceptual development of RAS employment, pushing beyond the platforms themselves to consider tactics, command and control, survivability, and integration at the combined arms team level.

A particular highlight of the quarter was the Regiment's participation as Battle Group LION during the North Queensland Warfighter Exercise. This activity showcased the Regiment's adaptability and professionalism, as we used analytical wargaming in conjunction with Defence Science and Technology Group and the Army Battle Lab to test theories related to new technologies, within a Brigade construct. Our soldiers demonstrated the discipline, initiative, and combat mindset that remain hallmarks of armoured warfare – regardless of the platforms employed. The results were clear: BG LION achieved all objectives, while simultaneously trialling new methods of command, control, and autonomous system employment under pressure.

The Regiment also had the privilege of hosting members of the UK Army's experimentation unit, the 2nd Battalion, The Royal Yorkshire Regiment. This collaboration provided an opportunity to exchange lessons, compare methodologies, and deepen the professional relationship between two like-minded Armoured Corps. Their observations and feedback validated our direction of travel and reaffirmed the Regiment's role as a pathfinder for Army's future force design.

Beyond our tactical achievements, regimental spirit has remained strong. A Regimental Dining Out Night was held at Torrens Parade Ground to commemorate the Battle of Coral-Balmoral, and honouring the Regiment's connection. Officers and Senior NCOs also gathered to honour the Battle of Messines with members of the 9th Brigade, reinforcing the intergenerational bonds of service and sacrifice that continue to shape our culture.

Looking ahead, July promises to be another milestone. The Regiment will deploy two combat experimentation sub-units in support of both 3rd and 7th Brigades during Exercise TALISMAN SABRE 2025, together with a precision loitering munition capability. Our participation on Exercise TALISMAN SABRE will provide an unparalleled opportunity to apply this year's experimentation in the context of a complex, joint and coalition setting. It is a chance to prove what we've learned, adapt further, and generate the insights Army needs to shape its future combat force.

The 1st Armoured Regiment remains fiercely committed to leading from the front and in the design of Army's next generation of capabilities.


